ILEAD USA Selects Library Assistant for 2017 Program

Mary Boykoff, a Library Assistant at the Memorial Library of Nazareth & Vicinity, has been selected as one of 19 Pennsylvania library workers to take part in ILEAD USA (Innovative Librarians Explore, Apply and Discover), a prestigious program designed to help library staff understand and respond to user needs through the application of participatory technology tools and the creation of an easy-to-duplicate model program.



Boykoff will serve as a member of one of five teams, along with fellow Pennsylvania library workers from public, academic and school libraries. Selection was through an application process. The teams participate in three four-day in-person sessions over the course of eight months, beginning in March. The teams work together to identify a community need and develop, manage, and evaluate a project to meet that need. They are assisted by instructors and mentors.

The sessions will be held at Harrisburg University. In addition to the Harrisburg sessions, teams will hold virtual meetings. This is the third year that Pennsylvania has participated in this national program. The ILEAD USA project is made possible by a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS).

Slate Belt Heritage Center Preservation Award

The Slate Belt Heritage Center, located at 30 North 1st Street, Bangor, Pa. is pleased to announce that it is now accepting applications for its' "Annual Heritage Award". The purpose of the award is to acknowledge individuals who have performed exemplary acts that promote and preserve the culture and heritage of the Slate Belt. Candidates may be an individual or group and can be nominated by themselves or by another party.

There will be three (3) categories:

- 1. Initiative Award: Applicant who has performed exemplary actions in promoting and preserving the Slate Belt heritage through in-kind actions. This means acts that do not necessarily involve monetary donations but can be unpaid service for a preservation cause.
- 2. Architectural Award: Applicant who is saving or conserving a historic building, place or artifact where restoration is authentic to preservation.
- 3. Special Focus Award: Applicant who is saving or conserving tradition or a body of knowledge. That individual who contributes to educational information via exhibits, documentation, internet, archival, etc.

Consideration is given to projects with:

A specific start and end date.

Whether the project meets generally accepted preservation or scholar standards.

Whether the project is considered "complete". Did project have a goal and did the project achieve the goal.

Whether the project had a significant impact with before and after photographs or proof that information or if a structure would otherwise be lost if the nominee had not done the project.

Nominations will be accepted this fall and will be reviewed in January of each year. The awards will be presented at a special program in June. One prize will be awarded with the possibility of one per category depending on committee's review of candidates. Nominations should include a description of entry, photos (if applicable), and any pertinent documentation. The Heritage Center retains the right to exhibit and/or publish the application materials, including photographs. Applications for those not chosen will be held on file, indefinitely, for future consideration.



5 Tax Tips

Preparing for your Tax Preparation appointment and more Part 2

- 1. Do you know that if you make a contribution to a traditional IRA, you can reduce your taxes as long as you have earned income. And you have until 4/15/2017 to make that contribution. The contribution will not be taxed until you take a withdrawal, hopefully after you have retired and are in a lower tax bracket. If you make a contribution to a Roth IRA, it is not tax deductible, but as long as it has been in the account for 5 years or more, it can be withdrawn at any age and the principal and interest is tax free. Many people like Roth IRAs to leave tax-free money to their loved ones.
- 2. Want to reduce next year's taxes and get a bigger refund? How about increasing your 401-K contributions. A small \$10 a week increase can possibly make you refund over \$500 larger. And if the employer matches any of your contributions, this is tax-deferred income that for which you didn't have to work. Free money!
- 3. Did you take a distribution from an IRA or a deferred retirement plan and you haven't reached retirement age? You will receive a 1099R from the investment institution. It may be subject to an additional 10% penalty besides being taxed as income. Frequently the investment institutions do not take sufficient withholding to cover the taxes and penalty. If that withdrawal from the deferred retirement account is just a loan, it is not taxed as long as re-payment are kept up-to-date. If the loan re-payment is defaulted on, the balance owing becomes a distribution with no withholding to offset the penalty and taxes. If you are thinking of taking a withdrawal, contact your tax professional prior to taking the distribution so we can advise you on how much withholding is needed and inform you of the tax consequences.
- 4. Delayed refunds for returns claiming certain credits. Due to law changes the IRS can't issue refunds before 2/15/2017 for returns that have Earned Income Credit or additional child tax credit. It is unlikely that your refund will arrive in your account until the week of 2/27/17 if no mistakes are detected.
- 5. Direct deposit of refunds is a faster and safer method to get your refunds. Remember to bring a check with you to the tax interview to alleviate any errors in entering the routing and account numbers. These important numbers are not available on your debit cards attached to your account. If you don't know your account numbers, your bank can provide them on their letterhead. Many banks will issue a small wallet size card to keep in your wallet.



Fun Valentine's Day Facts...... Did you know?

History of St Valentine's Day - Valentine's Day - the popular festival of love and romance traces its origin to ancient Roman festival and has not been created by card companies as some people believe it to be. There are various legends associated with the festival along with the belief that birds began to mate from this day. Popularity of the Valentine's Day festival stems from the combined effects of all these legends, beliefs and of course the wish to glorify the unparalleled feeling of love.

There are many variations to how Valentine's Day came to be. The most common stems from the third century about a Roman martyr saint named Valentine whom performed secret marriages in defience of Emporer Claudius II. Claudius realized that single soliders fought better than those that were married, therefore setting forth the law prohibitting marriage. However, Valentine saw the injustice and continued to conduct marriages until he was imprisioned by Claudius for doing so.

Another story shows where some of our Valentine's Day card traditions originate from. This story suggests that Valentine helped prisioners escape harsh conditions in a Roman prision while he was imprisioned as well. During his time of confinement it is believed that Valentine fell in love with a young girl who visited him. So before his death, this legend says that he wrote her a letter signed "From your Valentine". This closure is still used in modern day Valentine's Day cards.

The First Valentine's Day Card - The first known Valentine is said to have been written in 1415 by Charles, Duke of Orleans to his wife while he was imprisoned in the Tower of London following his capture at the Battle of Agincourt.

Approximately 1 billion Valentine's Day cards are exchanged in the United States each year. That's the largest card sending occasion of the year, next to Christmas.

The Rose-An Expression of Love - Roses are a beautiful symbol of love. The word rose comes from the Latin word rosa meaning red, and the flower has been a symbol of love since ancient times. The Rose is said to have been created by Chloris, the Greek goddess of flower. A rose is a blossom with a sensuous fragrance and delicately yet beautifully crafted petals. Roses are the most popular flower given on Valentine's Day.







2 1/2 Cups Flour (white or wheat) 1 Chicken or Beef Bouillon Cube 1 tsp. Salt

1/2 Cup Hot Water

1 Egg **Baking Sheet & Cookie Cutter**

Instructions:

- Step 1: Pre heat oven to 350°. Place 1/2 cup of water into a microwavable bowl and heat it until water is almost boiling. Then drop your bouillon cube into water to dissolve. • Step 2: Now throw all the ingredients into a mixing bowl and begin to stir until everything is combined. Mix all the ingredients together. Sprinkle a good amount of flour on your work surface and your hands. Place the biscuit dough onto the the floured board. Use a rolling pin to spread out the dough. Grab your cookie cutter and start cutting! It helped us to dip the cutter in some flour to prevent the dough from sticking to the cutter. Continue to cut your bones, alternating the placement of the cutter to get the most out of your dough.
- Step 4: Place the dog biscuits on the cookie sheet and bake at 350° for 30 minutes!



Season of Love Courtesy of Leck Veterinary Hospital

Winter is in full swing, so it's always nice to warm things up with tokens of love and appreciation when Valentine's Day comes around. The traditional chocolate and flowers are my favorite! But it's also a good time for a reminder to put those goodies safely out of reach of both dogs and cats.

The fat and sugar in chocolate can cause an upset stomach and this is what happens in most chocolate ingestion cases. However, chocolate can also be directly toxic because of a compound called theobromine. The more chocolate liquor there is in a product, the more theobromine there is. This makes baking chocolate the worst for pets, followed by semi-sweet and dark chocolate, then milk chocolate and chocolate flavored cakes and cookies. Signs of theobromine intoxication are vomiting, diarrhea, hyperactivity, tremors, seizures, racing heart, rhythm progressing to abnormal rhythms, and death in severe cases. If the chocolate was eaten recently, it may be possible to induce vomiting; otherwise, hospitalization and support are needed until the chocolate has worked it's way out of the system. A call to the Pet Poison Helpline, ASPCA Poison Control, or to your veterinarian can help calculate the risk, and go over the treatment options should you discover an empty box of chocolates at Fido's feet.

One of the most significant dangers to our feline friends comes in the form of true lily. Plant species from the Lilium (Easter Lily) and the Hemerocallis (Daylily) families will cause kidney failure and death in cats if ANY part of the plant is eaten. If a cat eats the equivalent of less than one leaf, it can become severely ill. They may vomit initially, then appear to be okay, but if treatment is delayed more than 18 hours, their kidneys will fail and they may die. Do not mess around with cats and lilies: make sure if you have these plants anywhere in or around your premises, your cat cannot access them. Should you suspect your cat has snacked on one, a visit to your veterinarian for blood monitoring and supportive

As little as 6 ounces of milk chocolate is enough to cause a moderate to severe reaction in a twenty pound dog. So remember, to share the love, but hide the chocolate and flowers!


